We are continuously evolving the product using the feedback from doctors, nurses and patients."

Salil Dadhich from the Trade Council in India highlights the rapid development of the SDG agenda in the country, particularly in addressing socio-economic and environmental issues. This progress is further bolstered by the Green Strategic Partnership between India and Denmark, which is expanding opportunities for Danish exports, notably in the healthcare sector. 'Under this partnership, health is identified as a crucial area, aligning with India's pressing needs,' explains Dadhich.

The Indian healthcare system is grappling with three critical challenges: availability, affordability, and accessibility. Dadhich emphasizes, "These are the main challenges of healthcare in the Indian context." This triad presents a complex scenario, necessitating

innovative solutions for comprehensive healthcare coverage across the nation's diverse population.

Dadhich further notes the importance of innovative approaches like those of vCare in overcoming these barriers. "vCare's online technology platform stands out in its capacity to effectively tackle these challenges by providing cost-effective, accessible, and last-mile healthcare delivery solutions. This distinctive positioning is particularly significant within the framework of the Indian healthcare landscape."

Khushboo Verma acknowledges that as a company, it is essential to make oneself relevant within societal challenges:

"We are fortunate to get the continued support from Foreign ministry of Denmark and be actively contributing to Green Strategic Partnership between India and Denmark using SDGs as the guiding star. We use these goals as a framework to tackle the specific healthcare challenges prevalent in India," she explains, adding that vCare is actively contributing to this effort and creating commercial value through its initiatives.

"We have established several collaborations in Uttar Pradesh and Gujarat. We're engaged with multiple private and public hospitals and institutes, and Memorandums of Understanding have been signed with partner hospitals. Our goal is to have 500 patients on the platform by end of this year."
